The Aquaponics Solar Greenhouse - the first of its kind in the UK – employs sustainable food growing techniques using aquaculture, farming fish, and hydroponics creating a hugely productive and efficient farming system with few inputs and many, high value outputs. Fish are grown and the nutrient rich water is then recycled into soilless vegetable production cleaning the water in the process so it can be constantly reused. This productive, edible ecosystem is housed in a purpose built passive solar greenhouse and combined with a variety of other complementary farming techniques such as producing fish and poultry food from insects, and growing quail, fed from by-products of the system.


